He collected almost \$1000 from members who are enthused to make their own peppermills following Mike's demo last month. Stop in and visit if you can. George Morris reported a successful tour of the Nakashima studio in New Hope, and discussed possible future trips over the summer. Remember, there are no scheduled club meetings in July and August.

The **featured item** this month was a demo by Bob Rosand, nationally known as the "grandfather of the Christmas tree ornament."



His web site is found at [www.rrosand.com/](http://www.rrosand.com/). Bob estimates he has made over 6000 ornaments, and his skill certainly supports that claim. Bob showed how he makes the 3 parts of the ornament, including the globe, which he describes as a flattened balloon shape, the icicle, with 4 segments, and the finial. Bob recommends using Sherwin Williams sanding sealer thinned with turpentine to get a clean cut and eliminate tearout. He showed us a simple thickness gauge he uses, made from coat hanger wire, and provided numerous valuable suggestions on tool choices, techniques, and suppliers. His signing pen is a Micron, 0.005" point

with archival ink, available from art supply houses. His choice of finish is Deft spray satin lacquer. He also made a miniature acorn birdhouse ornament with an ebony perch, using a special scraper he designed for the mating surfaces. Finally, he made a small Christmas tree ornament, using a special parting tool to make the evenly spaced cuts simulating branches. Pieces of his finished work (with credit to his wife for the painting !) are shown in the photo below. Thanks to Bob for doing a very fine presentation. He is not only a skilled turner, but also generous with his knowledge and an informative and pleasant personality.



We also had an interesting **Show and Tell** session. Many members participated, and photos of their efforts are shown here, with more on the web site.
